# of Learning in North ridge Schools



Northridge Hall of Fame Class of 2017

This month we continue our Hall of Fame articles by featuring **John H. Morrison.** 

John H. Morrison was the superintendent of the Northridge Local School District from 1933 to 1956. He followed **D. A. Puderbaugh** who was superintendent from 1926 to 1933. Many people of Northridge consider Morrison the first superintendent of the Northridge Local Schools. Some do not. Their conclusions depend upon the interpretation of the events of that time:

- Ebenezer schools were formed in 1923, and the original phase of Ebenezer Junior High (later named Esther Dennis Middle School) was built in 1926 for grades 6-9. Grades 10-12 attended schools in the Dayton school system. Puderbaugh was hired in 1926.
- On June 16, 1931, the Ebenezer Rural School District became the Northridge Local School District. By 1932 an eighteen-room addition had been added to the Junior High enabling grades 1-11

to attend; seniors continued attending Dayton schools.

• Under the leadership of the newly hired superintendent, John H. Morrison (1933), the first thirty-one member senior class graduated from Northridge Local Schools in 1934.

The dilemma...Puderbaugh was made superintendent in 1926 when the district was called Ebenezer. He continued as superintendent after the district's name was changed to Northridge. He could be considered the district's first superintendent. Morrison was the first superintendent hired by the newly renamed Northridge Schools. He presided over the first senior class to attend Northridge schools and to graduate from the same. He could be considered the first superintendent. In either case...

John H. Morrison served Northridge as superintendent for 23 years and before that was principal of the centralized junior high. guided Morrison Northridge through the difficult economic times of the 1930's and the war years of the 1940s. After WW II he had to cope with the rapid expansion of families moving to the suburbs and the rise of student enrollment. Under his leadership, while spending many countless hours of his personal time, he passed bond issues and oversaw the addition of nine more classrooms and a cafeteria at the now centralized school (grades 1-12) in 1945, the construction of Timberlane in 1952, Grafton Kennedy in 1954, and the addition of eight more rooms to Grafton Kennedy in 1955.

As **Hugh Sauer** (superintendent from 1967-76) and others have noted, Morrison was dedicated to Northridge and he was a generous

man. According to Sauer, Morrison often helped teachers and students overcome the lack of supplies by paying for them out of his own pocket. On another occasion, he was found aerating the sewage system performing maintenance for the district. At other times, Morrison sought the aid of and worked as a team with community members and faculty like **Frank Kelley, Dave Herring,** and others to fight for the betterment, not only of the Northridge schools, but the community as well.

As a result of his service, dedication, and generosity the district honored him in 1959 by naming the system's newest building the John H. Morrison Elementary School.

John H. Morrison was nominated by **Ruth Miller Bolen Howell** who was a member of the first graduating class - the Class of 1934.

### Kindergarten Students Honor Veterans

On November 11th, kindergarten students from TLC honored military veterans in a ceremony at the Veteran's Memorial located at the Northridge Stadium. TLC Principal **Tabitha Hardin** and teacher **Amanda Kohorst** assisted students as they placed a wreath at the veteran's memorial.




### **Student Achievement Recognition**

### Math Alive in Northridge

Students from K-12 are using ST Math to help learn and deepen their understanding of math concepts. ST Math is an online game-based instructional software that allows students to visually see math concepts to improve understanding and increase innovative thinking. Spatial-Temporal Reasoning allows the brain to hold visual representations to understand math standards and to aid students in improving their multi-step, problem solving skills.

Teachers across the district attended the ST Math Summit in Worthington, Ohio on November 3rd. **Steven Mills** (2nd grade), **Laura Inkrott** (Curriculum Coach), **Kathy Abrams** (7th grade), **Christie Healy** (Kindergarten), and **Tabitha Hardin** (Timberlane principal) learned about strategies to utilize ST Math effectively. Topics included brain research, problem solving in math, helping students find perseverance in solving math problems, and the importance of connecting ST Math time into classroom discussions and lessons.

**JiJi**, the ST Math mascot, even made an appearance at John H. Morrison Elementary and Timberlane Learning Center to help get the students excited about math! Students love to show what they have mastered and use what they learn in ST Math in their classrooms.

### Tech Bytes - News from the Northridge Technology Dept.

The staff and students at Timberlane Learning Center have been part of an exciting pilot experience with Clevertouch Plus Interactive Touchscreens. Each classroom has been using the touchscreen board as part of their daily instructional activities. Students are able to take part in interactive math activities, read books together as a class, view videos related to classroom content and use the touchscreen as a whiteboard. In addition to allowing for additional interactivity, the mobility of the touchscreens



allow teachers to move the boards around the classroom to better fit instructional activities. Overall, the pilot has been extremely successful and we are looking forward to adding additional boards to other classrooms in the district.

### School Delays/Closings

Inclement weather during the winter months can result in school cancellations because of unsafe travel conditions. The primary considerations in the decision to delay, dismiss, or cancel school are:

- safety of students and staff.
- street conditions.
- current weather and forecasts.
- status of bus fleet.
- condition of buildings and grounds.
- consultation with police, township road department, and other schools.

The delay/closing options for the Northridge Schools are:

- One-Hour Delay all schedules are adjusted one hour.
- TWO-HOUR DELAY all schedules are adjusted two hours except: A.M. preschool is closed. P.M. preschool reports at normal time.
- Closed all buildings are closed.

The decision to close and/or delay school is usually broadcast by area TV, radio stations, and the district one-call system by 6:30 a.m. In order to be sure you receive the district one-call, please contact your child's school to make sure they have your correct phone number on file.
