# 2020 Optimist International Essay Contest

The *Optimist International Essay Contest* is sponsored by *Optimist International* to give young people the opportunity to write about their own opinions regarding the world in which they live. The approach can encompass a young person's personal experience, the experience of their country or a more historical perspective. In additional to developing skills for written expression, participants also have the opportunity to win a college scholarship. *Optimist International* assigns a new topic each year and provides the rules and guidelines for holding this essay contest for students. The *Northridge Optimist Club* conducts a local level of the contest in conjunction with a selected grade level class within the Northridge schools. The winning contestant's essay is then eligible to compete for scholarship awards with other student essays at the Optimist District (State) level.

Several students in **Karen Forrer**'s eleventh grade English class at Northridge High School recently completed entries in the club level contest conducted by *Northridge Optimist Club*. The topic of the 2020 contest was "*Is Optimism the Key to Achieving The Dreams you Imagine?*" The essays were completed by the end of February to comply with the contest rules.

An awards luncheon had been scheduled for March 17th to honor the winners, but the school closing and "stay-at-home" order made this impossible this year. The awards have been announced online on the club website (<a href="http://www.northridgeoptimist.org/essay-contest-2020.html">http://www.northridgeoptimist.org/essay-contest-2020.html</a>), and award materials have been mailed to the contestants.

The first place award went to **Leah Adkins**, second place to **Ashley Kessler**, and third to **Kira Ball**.

Honorable Mention awards went to Benjamin Vo, Diamonique Story, Corey Soles, and Hana Barajas.

The top three received an Olympic style medallion (gold, silver and bronze), and all contestants received a certificate for their placing. Leah's winning essay was sent on to compete statewide with other winning student essays for a chance at a \$2500 scholarship from *Optimist International*.

The members of the *Northridge Optimist Club* pass along their thanks to all of the students for their fine essays, to Northridge High School and staff for hosting the event, to the judges **Tina Rezash Rogal** and **Kristen Tomlinson** for their significant efforts, and especially to **Karen Forrer** who put in a lot of extra effort on the project. # Public Hearing: Community Input Welcome on CCIP Funds



# **Need Help with Food This Summer?**

The Polar Bear Cafe (PBC) is pleased to offer nutritional support to children ages 1-18 this summer. The USDA waived many rules in the *Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)* during the COVID-19 pandemic crisis allowing the PBC to provide bulk meals for pickup. Each child will receive 5 breakfast meals and 5 lunch meals that meet or exceed the SFSP meal pattern requirements.

**Registration is required!** Visit www.PolarBearCafe.org to register online or stop by the school to complete a paper copy. Each family will be given a number tag issued to your household and must be displayed at pickup.

**Pickup Details** - Tuesdays ONLY from 3:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m. (May arrive no earlier than 2:30 p.m. to get in line.) June 16, 2020 - August 18, 2020

An adult may pick up meals for all children in the household; children are not required to be present. Plan to get foods that require refrigeration, needing to be safely stored as soon as possible after pick up.

### **COVID-19 Won't Stop Our Improvements**

For many around the world, learning something new and improving skills has been a focal point during these times. On top of planning distance-learning lessons, virtual meetings, and staying in contact with students and families. our Northridge staff has continued their professional learning to sharpen their skills as well. Teachers are learning new strategies to engage their learners through Google Teachers in grades Classroom. K-5 attended a virtual professional development with Lisa Combs about social emotional learning and how to embed that into instruction.

Teachers are participating in book studies to meet the needs of gifted learners as well. Staff members are completing self-paced webinars on many topics, including specific content areas, teacher self-care, and literacy. In the midst of uncertainty, there is something certain—we will all come back better!

This time has also been spent planning for the future. Kindergarten readiness is crucial to the rest of a child's academic journey. To better meet the needs of our youngest learners, the district has been working with Preschool Promise and the University of

Dayton. Through our collaboration, we have created a survey that will be going out to families of our current preschool students and kindergarteners. Topics of the surveys include ways we can support children birth to age 3, what school schedule works best for families of preschoolers, and why parents did/did not send their child to preschool.
