Each month, the *Dividends* will feature one of the new members of the 2015 *Northridge Hall of Fame*. We begin this month with **Jim Clark**, class of 1972.

A proud 1972 graduate of Northridge High School, **Jim Clark** remains forever grateful to Northridge school and staff members. "They never gave up on me, even when I made it difficult for them." He applauds their dedication and devotion and believes, "They made a big difference in my life."

Jim has furthered his education through classes, course work, and seminars at both Sinclair Community College and Wright State University. Such subject areas include arbitration, business law, collective bargaining, labor studies, and grievance policy.

Jim's many lifetime positions have placed him in the following various service positions: General Motors/Delco, 1973; IUE/CWA, Union Committee representative, 1983; plant chairman representative, 1995; IUE chairman of auto-

motive conference board, 2001; and elected president of IUE/CWA, 2005.

In his current position, Jim oversees the union's manufacturing division, which represents over 300 U.S. facilities, 240 local unions, and more than 50,000 active members. Currently he is spearheading the Division's attempt to improve union members' job security by bringing a union friendly version of high performance or lean manufacturing into IUE/CWA work sites. In his leadership role, he currently sits on the AFL/CIO Industrial Union Council and is an outspoken leader for fair trade laws and a revitalized U.S. manufacturing policy.

His years of service have earned Jim various honors. In 2012, he was named by the White House as a "Champion of Change" for efforts to advance corporate environmental sustainability. Jim received the "David L. Clendenin Award" in 2007 from the Workers Defense League in New York. Earlier in 2005, he was given a "Labor Leadership Award" by the Miami Valley AFL/CIO.

Through commitment and service, Jim stands out for taking a common sense and innovative approach to bargaining for job preservation while still recognizing economic realities in a global market place. He strives to reduce health care costs through community initiatives to assess needs and through education of members and health care providers.

Jim and his wife, Carla, have been married for thirty-six years.

They are the proud parents of Matthew, Megan, and Katelin. They also have three grandchildren, Avery, Hadley, and Adeline.



## Search For Children With Disabilities

The Northridge Local School District, along with other school districts across the state of Ohio, continue participating in an effort to identify, locate and evaluate all children from birth through 21 years of age who may have disabilities. Disability, in this instance, means such conditions as cognitive disability, hearing impairment, speech or language imimpairment, pairment, visual emotional disturbance, orthopedic impairment, autism, traumatic brain injury, other health impairment, specific learning disability, deaf-blindness, and multiple disabilities. Public schools have responded vigorously to federal and state mandates requiring the provision of a free appropriate public education regardless of a child's disability. Many children with disabilities are not visible because they do not function in the mainstream of the community. Also, some identified children with disabilities are preschoolers.

The Northridge Local School District is interested in meeting the needs of children with disabilities. 
#### Northridge Optimist Club Celebrates 50th Anniversary

#### **School Delays/Closings**

Inclement weather during the winter months can result in school cancellations because of unsafe travel conditions. The primary considerations in the decision to delay, dismiss, or cancel school

- safety of students and staff.
- street conditions.
- current weather and forecasts.
- status of bus fleet.
- condition of buildings and grounds.
- consultation with police, township road department, and other schools.

The delay/closing options for the Northridge Schools are:

- one-hour delay all schedules are adjusted one hour.
- two-hour delay all schedules are adjusted two hours except: Preschool at the TLC is closed, but kindergarten is on a twohour delay.
- *closed* all buildings are closed.

The decision to close and/or delay school is usually broadcast by area TV, radio stations, and the district one-call system by 6:30 a.m. In order to be sure you receive the district one-call, please contact your child's school to make sure they have your correct phone number on file.
